Field Trips: Next field trips:

- August 23: Save the date for this special field trip to Ladew Gardens and Heartwood
 Nursery. A chance to see a remarkable public garden just over the border in MD which
 features a native butterfly house and native nature trail in the morning. Then off to
 Heartwood Nursery, south of York, which specializes in a unique collection of native
 hollies and other native shrubs and plants for a tour of the propagation house and
 varieties they grow.
 - Ladew Gardens Address: 3535 Jarrettsville Pike, Monkton, MD (first exit off I-83 into MD)
 - Arrive at Ladew Gardens by 10:00 am to tour the gardens on your own or find others at the entrance at 10:00am. Sign up at arrival for a timed entry to the Butterfly House if interested. Entry cost is \$20 per person/\$14 for seniors. No additional cost for butterfly garden. Those who might want to tour the house

Connecting people and native plants for a healthy planet for an additional cost may want to arrive before 10:00am. Comfortable walking shoes recommended.

Jane - Did children's workshop at The Bower. Goldfinch flew over with huge green caterpillar and dropped it on the table! Was a tulip silkmoth caterpillar. Had suction-cup feet. Kids loved it!

Showed slide show of member garden tour 2025. Lorrie P. put together:

- Mary & Paul L. Sunny site but has become more shady due to tree plantings. Very densely planted. Loads of variety. Organized, but naturalistic. Signage listing the plants. About 90 different native species. Large berm with sea of woodland sunflower. Installed dry well to capture excess runoff. Lots of Pennsylvania sedge
- Kevin M. at McGrath's Bakehouse. Approx 7 acres. Lovely vegetable garden. Worked with DCNR to convert lawn to meadow. They have issue with narrow-leaf plantain but still looks lovely. Good variety of flowers. Also planted 60 trees to create "mini forest".
- Mimi C. house in Arcona. Very densely planted. Allows self-seeding. Hummingbirds on native honeysuckle. Brought plants from former yard.
- Thanks to the hosts and to Lorrie P. for setting everything up!

Upcoming Event: Craighead house, Carlise. Heather giving talk about artist Maria Sybilla Merian who self-funded scientific discovery 200 years before Darwin. First to document metamorphosis of butterfly.
